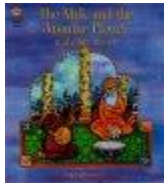


Celebrating Religious Diversity: Sikhism

The milk and the jasmine flower : and other stories **By Anita Ganeri, illustrated by Olwyn Whelan**

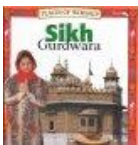

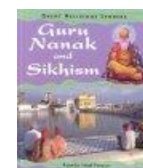
My Sikh year **By Cath Senker**
